List of practical components, each will have 4 hrs / Week (Minimum 08 assignments)

- 2. Prepare autobiography of your favorite journalist, columnist or pioneer of journalism (Minimum 3 assignments foreign, Indian and regional level)
- 3. Article and feature writing on travel, historical, habits, nature and personality profile. Etc. (Minimum of 5 assignments should be attended).
- 4. Comparison with same news appeared in two different newspapers (Minimum of 5 assignments should be attended).
- 5. Media visit (Local newspaper organization). During media visit student will study the functions of various sections of newspaper organization.
